The strategy returned 2.74% in AU\$ terms in June and 6.38% for the quarter.

World markets rose during the quarter, as a large coordinated fiscal stimulus was proposed to accompany ultra-low interest rates.

Economic activity appears robust in North America even without the new 'infrastructure' spending proposed. US Fed policy could be described as "we're going to close the barn door after the inflation horse has bolted but closing it before he has gotten too far away will still be ok."

US policy is also very skewed toward 'equity of outcomes' and is essentially interventionist to an extent that rolls back the President Reagan era reforms.

Asia is seeing temporary headwinds from a resurgence of Covid, monetary and fiscal tightening by China and aggressive rhetoric toward Taiwan to coincide with the 100 year's anniversary of the Chinese Communist Party. This too shall pass.

Europe opens slowly from Covid. The summer tourist season is needed to help the economies recover – especially 'Club Med'. Calls for a "coordinated fiscal stance" grow louder from those countries who would benefit most, and the Germans are on the hook. In addition, the 'weaponisation of ESG' has begun with a proposed Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism to raise tariffs on producers of goods with greenhouse gases embedded. India and China aka low-cost producers are the target. It is essentially protectionism and a tax on consumers and reversing globalisation.

Inflation will not be transitory but remain at a level which will make fixed income investments lose money in real terms. In addition to ultra-loose monetary policy and fiscal incontinence, we also have demographic, trade tariffs / National Industrial Policy with ESG as the justification for tariffs, and the 'green revolution', all acting as a tailwind to rising prices.

Supply and demand remain relevant forces even if this new paradigm is venturing where we haven't been before. You will need to think hard about how to hedge inflation and tax increases and more government intervention in the allocation of your capital.

We remain invested in companies benefitting from increased industrial activity, productivity enhancing investment (true technology, infrastructure) and those with a margin of balance sheet safety – KLA Corp (KLAC.NASDAQ), Emerson Electric (EMR. NYSE), Shin-Etsu Chemical (4063.TYO), Heidelberg Cement (HEI. ETR), CRH (CRH.LON).

We like Japan and Asia on valuation, fiscal resilience and improving governance. Shareholder activism is on the rise in Japan which will help continue the trend toward better treatment of shareholders.

Large US companies are in the cross hairs of anti-trust regulation. There are five bills in debate in Congress currently, all of which would hinder the ability of 'Big Tech' to run integrated, closed architecture platforms and make acquisitions to stifle incipient competition.

- The "American Innovation and Choice Online Act" would prohibit companies from discriminating against smaller competitors and prioritizing their products ahead of others.
- The "Platform Competition and Opportunity Act" would empower regulators to block dominant companies from acquiring would-be competitors.
- The "Ending Platform Monopolies Act" would prohibit companies from stomping out smaller competitors and undermining fair and free online competition.
- The "Augmenting Compatibility and Competition by Enabling Service Switching (ACCESS) Act" would make it easier for new companies to enter the market by changing requirements that affect costs for businesses.
- The "Merger Filing Fee Modernization Act" would update filing fees for mergers "for the first time in two decades," according to the press release, so that regulators could better enforce antitrust laws.

We still argue small cap is a better place to be - cheaper and typically less exposed to regulation. We hold no investments in Facebook, Amazon, Google or Apple.

Notable performers in June were Johnson Controls (JCI.NYSE)+15%, Ebara (6361.TYO) + 20%, Kurita Water (6370.TYO) + 10%, CRH + 8%, Ping An Insurance (601318.SHA) –18%. The last of these is suffering temporarily from monetary tightening by the PBOC and fears of continued credit defaults in China. We have reaffirmed our valuation and remain investors. How ironic that China is following a more traditional fiscal and monetary approach than the USA by tightening?! Short term pain but long term a better policy.

The portfolio remains well diversified across sectors and geographies.

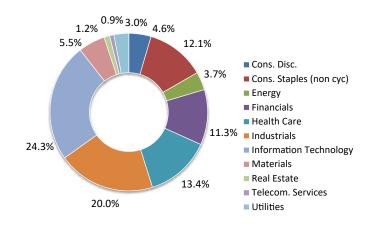
